#### **DEMOGRAPHY**

- Lisboa is the capital of a country with 10.4 million inhabitants and the centre of a metropolitan region with a population of 2.9 million.
- Being the country's capital has costs.
   Every day the city's population grows by 70 per cent due to commuter movements.
- Lisboa demographics have stabilized in terms of the number of inhabitants, now standing at around **550,000 residents.** 
  - After losing almost a third of its population over the last five decades, the trend after 2011 is for stabilization.
- The Lisboa Metropolitan Area is where the country's economic decision-making centres are located.
  - It accounts for around **36% of the country's GDP** and **employs around 1.5 milion people** (30% of the country's employment), with an apparent labor productivity 1.2 times higher than that of the country.









## Main Nationalities - Foreign population living in the Municipality of Lisboa










#### GVA and employment by economic activity in the Lisboa Metropolitan Area





## **BUSINESS AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP**

- The Lisboa Metropolitan Area (LMA) has many high-tech companies and research centers. It has approximately 390 thousand firms located there.
- The number of workers employed by foreign companies and in the high-tech sectors in Lisboa exceeds the national average.
- **Lisboa** remains an **attractive location** for many **multinational companies**, with the potential for expansion. Shared service centres and nearshore services tend to establish here.
- Software and internet, as well as health and well-being services, are the main sectors with great potential for development here.







#### **Export intensity of sectors**



## **HUMAN CAPITAL**

- Lisboa provides a pool of highly skilled professionals who are adaptable, innovative, linguistically diverse, and competitive, with 40% of Lisboa Metropolitan Area inhabitants holding advanced academic degrees.
- Around a quarter of the country's workers and employed people are in the Lisboa region, where there are currently approximately 104 thousand people without jobs.
- Lisboa Metropolitan Area has an R&D expenditure ratio of 2 per cent of GDP, a significant figure in the European context. Around 166.000 of students were enrolled in higher education in 2022/2023
- The Lisboa Region accounts for about 41 per cent of the country's total research and development expenditure, with the business sector responsible for 58 per cent of this.





#### Average monthly earnings LMA (2019)




























November 2023 was an important milestone for the city of Lisboa. The distinction awarded to the Portuguese capital by the European Innovation Council has given even greater visibility to the city's innovative ecosystem, as well as recognizing the work of the municipality in supporting innovation.

Lisboa wants to consolidate its position within the European context, as a global, creative, sustainable, and inclusive city. The Unicorn Factory Lisboa (UFL), the focal point of this dynamic, has been continuing to train more scale ups and boost new hubs such as Gaming, Web 3, Green and Al, which attract more companies and investors. True nerve centers, they are changing the face of the territory, having been boosted from the Beato Innovation District, an important hub for promoting innovation, which houses the headquarters of Unicorn Factory Lisboa and other global technology companies.

Lisboa's network of experimentation and open innovation continues to grow, supported by strong investment in municipal spaces that offer everyone the opportunity to experiment, create and innovate. Lisboa's entrepreneurial and innovative community also remains vibrant, driven by projects and initiatives and connected to the city that provides the ideal conditions for its growth and development.

The legacy of Lisboa European Capital of Innovation will live on. The seeds of creativity and entrepreneurial spirit sown in the meantime will bear fruit. By transforming lives and people, they will contribute to Lisboa's affirmation.
